Connecting to Existing Gutters

Each radius piece has a special lap joint at one end. The adjoining piece will slide over the lap joint to fit nice and snug. This leaves a small seam between the pieces, but after you fill the seam with a special recommended polyester filling putty, it leaves a smooth seamless appearance that is paint ready.



1. First, prepare the existing gutter. From the end, measure in 1 $1/2^{"}$. At this mark use your metal snips and cut the front lip of the gutter (where the hidden hanger fits into), including the top.



2. With a pair of bending pliers, bend up the inch and a half flap, so the radius gutter can slide into the existing gutter.



3. In the 3rd photo, the radius gutter slides into the existing gutter up to the point where the flap was cut. 800 Fulgham Ste. #24 Plano, TX 75093 214-215-8369


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4. With the bending pliers, fold the cut flap over the radius gutter and crimp down to hold tight.

5. Lastly, seal with a gutter sealant.

Note: If your slope is correct on both pieces, the seam will be almost unnoticeable.
